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Federation of Virginia Food Banks to Launch Milk for Good *Pilot program will be first statewide campaign to provide milk for food insecure families*

VERONA, Va. (Dec. 5, 2019) — Wednesday at the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank, Virginia Secretary of Agriculture, Bettina Ring, and Commissioner of the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS), Dr. Jewel Bronaugh, announced the launch of the *Milk for Good* campaign, the first statewide dairy purchase program to benefit food insecure families. *Milk for Good* is an initiative of the Federation

of Virginia Food Banks in partnership with The Dairy Alliance, the American Dairy Association North East, and the Virginia Dairymen's Association. Beginning in January 2019, each of the seven Federation members will receive 200 half-gallons per week over a 24-week pilot period.

According to Feeding America's Map the Meal Gap report, nearly 894,000 Virginians (including 249,000 children) experience food insecurity, which means they struggle to afford enough food at any point throughout the year.

Milk is often an unaffordable commodity for food insecure households. The 2014 Hunger Study, the

most comprehensive survey of food pantry clients conducted in Virginia, found that 43% of respondents (more than 57,000 people) said they would like access to more dairy products in their local pantries.

"Dairy products, and fluid milk in particular, are among the most in-demand items at our 2,000 partner agencies," said Federation Executive Director, Eddie Oliver. "This program will put fresh, locally processed milk in the hands of families who need it most

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and will advance our efforts to increase the availability of nutritious products on our pantry shelves."

"We're serving 106,000 individuals every month through our partner agencies across 25

counties. Children make up about a third of those individuals," said Michael McKee, CEO of the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank and Chairman of the Board of the Federation of Virginia Food Banks. "Dairy is such a good source of nutrition, especially for children who need healthful nutrients to develop and thrive."

to providing milk to families in need. The Dairy Alliance granted \$49,000 in new refrigeration units to eighteen pantries throughout the Commonwealth, and the

American Dairy Association North East, which supports the dairy industry in four northern Virginia counties, granted \$8,250 for new coolers at three Alexandria pantries.

"Ounce for ounce milk provides eight grams of protein per eight-ounce serving," said Molly Szymanski, Chief Operating Officer for The Dairy Alliance. "If you look at other protein sources, you'd be hard pressed to find one that provides as much high-quality protein as you would find in milk. It's just

wonderful that we're moving forward with the Milk for Good program that's going to make a reality of more fresh milk for our families in Virginia."

"I'm thrilled to be here to launch the Milk for Good campaign, the first statewide, dairy purchase program to benefit food-insecure families. Milk for Good is a true partnership for good," said Virginia Secretary of Agriculture & Forestry Bettina Ring. "The milk will be distributed through partner agencies in localities throughout Virginia. Their efforts to secure more locally processed milk will not only strengthen access to quality nutrition for food-insecure families, but our agricultural economy will benefit as well."
