

Annual School Food Drive Results in 11,516 Pounds of Food Collected for Blue Ridge Area Food Bank

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (April 5, 2022) – With area schools back in session for inperson learning, the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank's 2022 School Food Drive, which ran from March 7-25, was the most successful in its 11-year history. Led by student food drive coordinators Kat Ravichandran and Emily Warren of Albemarle High School, more than 11,516 pounds of food were collected – enough to provide 8,849 meals for our community members facing hunger.

Kat was in her second year as the School Food Drive student coordinator while Emily participated in the role for the first time. In addition to the drive, the two are involved with a student group called "Students Working Against Hunger" to fight food insecurity in the Charlottesville region.

The two students recruited 22 schools to participate in the region-wide food drive. Stone Robinson Elementary School has the distinction of collecting the most pounds of food—1,185 pounds to be exact. Field School of Charlottesville came in at a close second with 1,178 pounds of food collected.

"The School Food Drive is a great example of what students across the region can accomplish when coming together," said Ravichandran. "While this will be my last time as a student coordinator for the drive, I feel so proud of what we've accomplished this year, and past years, and look forward to hearing about the positive impact the food collected will have on our neighbors battling food insecurity."
